





UNDERSEA WARFARE NEWS

With Russia's Land Invasion Bogged Down, Moscow May Turn to Submarine Warfare. But resorting to submarine warfare reflects Russian weakness more than strength.



With Russia's land invasion bogged down, it may turn to the sea as another way of hurting Ukraine. <u>Russian submarines</u> in the Black Sea could target ships exporting Ukrainian wheat and other resources, according to experts at a British think tank.

This would be a problem for Ukraine, which already has its hands full, waging a ground war against a massive Russian army. "The skills and capabilities needed for Ukraine to conduct anti-submarine warfare (ASW) along Western lines would be time-consuming and expensive to generate," Sidharth Kaushal and Kevin Rowlands write in a March 7 essay for the Royal United Services Institute (RUSI).

To be clear, resorting to submarine warfare reflects Russian weakness more than strength. Russia's navy dwarfs Ukraine's motley collection of light Soviet-era warships. Yet Ukrainian resourcefulness—such as using locally made Neptune anti-ship missiles to sink the Black Sea fleet flagship *Moskva*—has kept Russian surface ships from operating near the Ukrainian coast. This has deprived <u>Russian ground troops</u> of the fruits of naval superiority, such as naval gunfire and amphibious landings behind Ukrainian lines.

But with its invasion halted after a subpar performance from both the army and air force, Russia may have few other options left. "Should the conflict reach a point of enduring, frozen stalemate, Russia may shift its military focus to wearing down the Ukrainian economy," Kaushal and Rowlands said.

Missile and drone <u>bombardment of Ukraine's electrical grid</u> hasn't broken down morale. But strangling Ukrainian exports could be devastating. The world depends on Ukrainian wheat, corn, and sunflower products; the war has resulted in a <u>30 percent drop</u> in Ukrainian grain exports, resulting in rising global food prices and food insecurity. Equally important, Ukraine needs export revenue to sustain its economy and pay for weapons.

Under fierce criticism for creating global hunger, Russia agreed to a <u>United Nations-sponsored deal</u> that allowed shipping of some Ukrainian grain through safe corridors in the Black Sea. While Russia could withdraw from the agreement, the Kremlin would pay a political price.

Submarines offer a less risky option. So far, the Black Sea Fleet's handful of Kilo and Improved Kilo-class diesel subs have only been used to fire cruise missiles at Ukrainian land targets. But they can also lay <u>mines</u>. The boats "can clandestinely lay <u>up to 24 naval mines</u> each during a single sortie," noted the RUSI essay. They could even sink ships with torpedoes and anti-ship missiles.

Of course, the world would know who was responsible. But mines and submarines are <u>stealthier</u> than surface ships; this anonymity allows deniability. Moscow could deny responsibility for any attack or try to pin the blame on Ukraine while some Western governments would be happy for an excuse to avoid military confrontation with a nuclear-armed Russia.

In fact, the precedent is already there. During the Spanish Civil War, ships bringing supplies to the Spanish Republican government were attacked by "pirate" submarines. Britain and France were well aware that the "pirates" were German and Italian subs supporting Franco's Nationalist faction, but the appearement-minded democracies had a pretext for merely sponsoring a symbolic resolution calling for the pirate subs to be attacked.

Whether Russian subs would actually sink any ships is almost immaterial. The threat of mine and submarine attack would raise maritime insurance rates so high as to discourage trade. In 2019, "insurance rates in the Strait of Hormuz rose tenfold after Iran's limpet mine attacks—even though a convoy system was put in place," the RUSI article noted.

Should Russia resort to a submarine blockade, Ukraine has few good options. The country has minimal anti-submarine warfare equipment or experience, and other priorities for its resources.

Nor can the West fill the gap. "The platforms involved are too expensive and small in number to be gifted," RUSI said. "Assets such as the P-8 maritime patrol aircraft or specialist ASW frigates are unlikely to be transferred, and the Ukrainian armed forces would struggle to crew, operate and protect them in any case."

But rather than destroying Russian submarines—an arduous task even for advanced navies like the U.S.—Ukraine could simply attempt to harass them, argues RUSI. Ukraine could deploy antisubmarine mines such as the U.S. <u>Hammerhead</u>, or unmanned aircraft equipped with dipping <u>sonar</u> and anti-submarine torpedoes. This would be made easier by the shallow depth of the Black Sea near the Ukrainian coast.

This approach might not destroy many submarines. Yet hearing a sonar ping from a drone —or knowing mines are in the area—might compel a Russian sub skipper to behave less aggressively.

"Ukraine can impose upon the Kilos and their operators a set of conditions which—though they may not end the submarine threat—will strain both vessels and crews," conclude the RUSI experts.

It's not a perfect solution, but it's one that Ukraine can afford.

WELCOME LUNCHEON



CDR ROYCE PETTIT ETERNAL PATROL

Royce qualified in submarines on the USS Barracuda (was K-1) (SSK-1) in 1953 and was a CDR when he left the Navy. Royce E. Pettit Jr. of Phoenix, AZ, formerly of Reynolds, IL, passed peacefully on April 17th. He was born on February 1, 1928 and was the eldest child of Royce E. Pettit and Dorothy Clarke Waite Pettit. Foregoing his senior year of high school in Reynolds, he attended a military prep school. attended the U.S. Naval Academy from which he graduated in 1950. His specialty was as a submariner and anti-submarine warfare specialist. Upon graduation he served on the destroyer USS Perry as the ASW officer. He then spent time at the submarine school in New London CT, upon graduation there he was assigned to his first submarine USS K-1 then the USS Picuda. In 1956-1958 he was in charge of the Naval ROTC at the University of Louisville. He was then assigned to the submarines USS Tang followed by the USS Ronquil. In November 1959, he married his wife Odile Simats whom he met in Vancouver, Canada during shore leave. From 1961-1963 he was seconded to the Royal Australian Navy as an ASW instructor. He then became the commanding officer of the USS Baya. Moving to Hawaii he was on the staff of the USN ASW Force, Pacific. Royce then moved to the East Coast to become the ASW officer on CV-18 USS Wasp. Moving to West Germany in 1969 he was the information officer for Joint Defense Headquarters Europe. His last duty station was as Executive Officer for Great Lakes Naval Training Center. While there he earned his MBA in business

CDR HARRY ELLIS ETERNAL PATROL

Perch Base Holland Club Member and Life Member CDR Harry B. Ellis, USN (ret), 87, passed away February 14, 2020. Harry was born August 26, 1927, and joined the Navy, serving in World War II, Korea and Vietnam. Harry joined Perch Base USSVI in August 2000. Perch Base officers had been trying unsuccessfully to make contact with Harry, but the assisted living facility where he was living would not allow access during the COVID lockdown period and would not discuss his status. Sadly, it was not until we discovered the location of his inurnment, with his wife, Marjory, in the National Cemetery of Arizona (Section F7, Row B, Site 25) that we learned he had passed onto Eternal Patrol. Harry's first submarine assignment was when he reported to the USS Raton (SSR-270). He later qualified and served on the USS Sea Devil (SS-400) in 1953 and again in 1960 as its Commanding Officer. Harry also commanded the USS Tilefish (SS-307) in 1960.

Perch Base Holland Club Member and Life Member Capt. Richard John Noreika, USN (Retired), 85, passed away April 5, 2023, after a long battle with Alzheimer's and dementia. Richard was born May 25, 1937. Richard earned a degree in engineering from the United States Naval Academy, Class of '59, 3rd Company. Richard proudly served his country as an officer in the U.S. Navy for 26 years. He had a distinguished naval career serving on the destroyer the USS Bailey and many submarines including the USS Patrick Henry, USS Tinosa, USS Batfish (as the executive officer), USS Kamehameha (as the commanding officer), and the USS Michigan Trident submarine (as the commanding officer). Richard was assigned sea duty for every Navy assignment from the time he graduated from the Naval Academy in 1959, until he took command of the Trident Refit Facility in Bangor, Wash. in 1982. He spent over seven years underwater and was away from his family over 65 percent of the time. Richard's last duty of assignment was at the Pentagon as head of electronics in Washington, D.C. Richard's individual accomplishments are too numerous to mention here. Richard was very proud to have served in the U.S. Navy, and his family was just as proud of him. Richard's only regret was that it was a difficult life for his family. Dick will be inurned at the Naval Academy Columbarium in Annapolis, Md., in a family service at a later date.




