

Newsletter Editor - Chuck Emmett was not at the meeting.


Ship's Storekeeper - Jim Nelson had nothing new to report.



50/50 DRAWING



Traditionally, United States submarines have been named after fish and other marine creatures. One exception was the Navy's first submarine HOLLAND which was named after its inventor, John Philip Holland. Today, ballistic missile submarines are named for famous American patriots, with the newest class, the OHIO class, named after states. The LOS ANGELES class of attack submarines are named for United States cities.

Records for enemy shipping sunk by U.S. submarines during World War II are held by two boats built by Electric Boat. The USS FLASHER sank 100,231 tons of Japanese shipping, while the USS TAUTOG holds the record for the most ships - 26.

Per cubic inch, there is more science packed into a submarine than into any other warship. Submariners say 'There is room for everything aboard a submarine except a mistake.'

In 1921, a United States submarine, the R-14, having run out of fuel at sea, rigged sails from blankets, hammocks, curtain rods and the ramrod of a 3-inch gun, and sailed 100 miles to port at a speed of two knots.

More decorations for valor have been awarded, per man, to the submarine service than any other Navy Branch.

Habitability is heavily stressed in the construction of modern submarines. Specially designed color schemes, mechanical conveniences, air conditioning, and the best chow in the Navy are supplied to make the vessels more livable. A full time staff is maintained by Electric Boat Division to work out 'human engineering' problems.





U.S.S. Escola (SS-294) October 17, 1944 80 men lost





USS ESCOLAR (SS-294) had her final training for combat at Pearl Harbor, from which she put out for her first war patrol 18 September and proceeded to Midway to top off with fuel. There she joined USS CROAKER (SS-246) and USS PERCH (SS-

313) and left on 23 September to conduct a coordinated patrol in the Yellow Sea north of 30°N. Cdr Millican was in command of this coordinated attack group, which was designated "Millican's Marauders."

On 30 September, when ESCOLAR was estimated to be about north of the Bonin Islands, the following partial message was received from her: "This from ESCOLAR X attacked with deck gun boat similar to ex-Italian Peter George five OTYI ——."Although no further transmissions were ever received by bases from ESCOLAR, who was forced to break off the transmission and the engagement with the gunboat at that time, CROAKER had stated that she suffered no damage and was in frequent communication with PERCH and CROAKER until 17 October 1944.



ported that on 17 October she had received a message from *ES*that she was in position 33!-44'N;127!-33'E, and was heading for 06'E. Neither *PERCH* nor *CROAKER* could raise *ESCOLAR* by transmission was received.

left her area on the scheduled date, she would have arrived at Mid-November 1944. All attempts to contact *ESCOLAR* failed and she on 27 November 1944 as presumed lost. It is assumed that she 17 October. Information supplied by the Japanese on anti-submagives no clue as to the cause of her loss, but the Yellow Sea area have been mined. A course line plotted between the two positions does not cross any known Japanese mine lies, but positions of fore April 1945 are not definitely located. The known minefields in

Tsushima Strait were laid in April 1945. However, there were mines in the general area of ESCOLAR's predicted position, and the most likely explanation for her end is that she detonated a mine.
