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

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

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Origins of Veterans Day

orld War I, also known as "The Great War," was fought from 1914 to 1918. During this conflict, Great Britain, France, Russia, Belgium, Italy, Japan, the United States and other countries, which formed the "Allies," defeated the so-called "Central Powers," which included Germany, Austria-Hungary, Turkey and Bulgaria. On the "eleventh hour, of the eleventh day, of the eleventh month" of 1918, German leaders signed an armistice, or a temporary ending to hostilities, with the Allied powers. On that date, November 11, celebrations were held in New York City, Paris, London and in other cities around the globe. The following year, President Woodrow Wilson declared November 11 as "Armistice Day," a day to observe the ending of World War I.

On June 4, 1926, the U.S. Congress passed a resolution asking President Calvin Coolidge to call upon officials to "display the flag of the United States on all government buildings on November 11 and inviting the people of the United States to observe the day in schools and churches, or other suitable places, with appropriate ceremonies of friendly relations with all other peoples." Twelve years later, on May 13, 1938, Congress passed an Act making the 11th of November Armistice Day, a federal holiday.

Initially, Armistice Day was to be a day to honor veterans of World War I. But following the tremendous calls to arms and human sacrifice during World War II and the Korean conflict, veterans groups urged Congress to consider a day to celebrate U.S. veterans of all wars. On June 1, 1954, President Dwight Eisenhower signed a bill changing Armistice Day to Veterans Day.

Difference between Veterans Day and Memorial Day

Veterans Day in the United States is a day to honor all Americans who have served in the U.S. military, both during wartime and in peacetime. Memorial Day is a day for remembering and honoring Americans who have died serving the nation, especially those who died in battle or from wounds received during armed conflicts. On Veterans Day, Americans thank the living veterans for their service to the country and recognize that all who have served the country, not just those who have died, have made sacrifices and done their duty.

Randy Couture

World Champion, Actor, Businessman, and Brand Ambassador, U.S. Army Veteran


A high school wrestling state champion, U.S. Army soldier, three-time NCAA All-American, international Greco-Roman competitor, and six-time UFC World Champion and Hall of Famer, Randy Couture is a true icon in the sport of Mixed Martial Arts and the UFC. In addition to his stellar standing in combat sports, Couture is also a successful businessman, actor, and best-selling author.

Randy wrestled at the World Championships in Greco-Roman in 1991, 1993, 1995, and 1997 and became a three-

time Olympic team alternate (1988, 1992, and 1996), a semifinalist at the 2000 Olympic Trials, a three-time NCAA Division I All-American, and a two-time NCAA Division I runner-up (1991 and 1992) at Oklahoma State University.

By December of 1997, at the age of 33, Couture made his debut in the world of professional fighting, claiming victory in the Heavyweight division of his first appearance in the UFC and soon earning the moniker of "Randy 'The Natural' Couture." He has fought in 16 title fights and has six UFC title reigns in the Lightweight and Heavyweight divisions. He also became the 4th pro fighter to be inducted into the UFC Hall of Fame.

Couture's growing career in acting includes the hit films "The Expendables" and "The Expendables 2," opposite Sylvester Stallone and Bruce Willis. He reprised his role as Toll Road in "The Expendables 3." Randy also played a recurring character on CBS's "The Unit," in a role written specifically for him. Randy has appeared in Spike's "Lip Sync Battle", HBO's "Ballers", "Whose Line is it Anyway", "Dancing



Randy Couture served six years in the U.S. Army (1982-1988), attaining the rank of Sergeant in the 101st Airborne. In 2009, he founded the Xtreme Couture GI Foundation (XCGIF). The GI Foundation is dedicated to helping injured veterans of America's Armed Forces.

Couture has also teamed with Jay Glazer of Fox Sports and Green Beret and NFL player Nate Boyer to create Merging Vets and Players (MVP), a program designed to address the

challenges that many combat veterans and professional athletes face when transitioning their service/professional life toward a new mission in civilian life.

Most recently, he has become a brand ambassador for the uniquely veteran-founded Four Branches Bourbon. Four Branches is the only spirits company founded by veterans from all four major U.S. military branches , Army, Navy, Air Force, and Marines, and its signature bourbon is built on a rare four-grain mash bill (65% corn, 15% rye, 10% malted barley, 10% wheat) that delivers complexity, smoothness, and a "Kentucky kiss" finish. ■

World War II Veteran Grand Marshal

Charlie Johnson


U.S. Army Veteran

Charlie Johnson was a man whose life journey, from the battlefields of World War II to the streets of Cleveland and the hospitals of Arizona, was defined by an extraordinary commitment to service. Born on June 28, 1921, in Clarksburg, West Virginia, Johnson's lifelong ethos of duty was forged early in his military career.

Drafted on August 1, 1942, shortly after Pearl Harbor, he resolved "to be the best soldier the Army had." His potential quickly propelled him from an infantry rifle platoon to learning Morse code and, eventually,

training men for the Transportation Corps. He proudly served in the South Pacific from 1942 to 1945, including assignments in New Guinea, Hollandia, and the Philippines, where he loaded cargo onto a single, unescorted ship destined for action.

After the war, Johnson and his wife settled in Cleveland, Ohio, where he supported their five children by driving a streetcar and bus, opening a barbershop next to his wife's beauty salon, and working at the Post Office to secure their family home.



However, the next chapter of his life became his enduring legacy. In a powerful conversion to Catholicism, Johnson's innate calling to serve the community came to the forefront. In 1952, he opened a small storefront mission that evolved into the St. Martin De Porres Center, where he provided food for the hungry, clothing for the needy, and educational opportunities for local youth and seniors. Under his leadership as Executive Director, and with support from the Bishop and local businesses, the center expanded into a significant community resource.


He then transitioned his service into the church, becoming a Permanent Deacon in 1972, one of the first in the Diocese, a role from which he retired in 1994. From 1990, he also served as a Board Certified Chaplain in multiple hospitals, retiring from Banner Hospital in 2015 at the remarkable age of 94.

To this day, Charlie Johnson maintains an active life, enjoying golf, painting, and especially archery. He was a multi-medal recipient in archery, highlighted by a feature at the Las Vegas Shootout when he was 101. He resides in Phoenix, Arizona, with his wife, Bonnie, a fellow Chaplain.


















Business Community Grand Marshal

"I am honored to serve again — this time through business, leadership, and community," says Alvarez." n


















Korean War Veteran Grand Marshal

Jerry Santy

U.S. Air Force Master Sergeant (Ret.)

Following in the footsteps of his three brothers, who all served in World War II, Santy joined the military in 1952 upon graduating from high school. Rather than being drafted into the Korean War, he joined the Air Force. As his oldest brother was actually at Pearl Harbor, joining the military was one of the few options available to him in those days, since his parents couldn't afford his college education.

After completing basic training in Texas and radar training in Colorado, his first assignment was to Yuma, Arizona, not South Korea, as the conflict had ended by

1953. As an airborne avionics technician, he serviced the training aircraft there. His military career has spanned 17 assignments in 14 states over 20 years, including two full years at Hughes Aircraft Company, where he studied the newest radar systems.

He served in two wars, Korea and Vietnam, and remembers being on alert status during the Cuban Missile Crisis when he was stationed at Tyndall Air Force Base in Florida. While stationed there, he helped his squadron win the worldwide William Tell Flight Competition in the 1960s. He spent a year in Vietnam with the Spectre Program (technically in Laos, Cambodia, and Thailand, but that was all top secret in those days). As head of aircraft maintenance of the C-130 gunships, they flew night missions against enemy logistics on the Ho Chi Minh Trail. Upon his return to the United States, he was promoted to



Senior Master Sgt. However, he was informed that he would be promptly returning to Vietnam for an additional tour. After serving one tour in Vietnam, he declined the promotion and instead said he would retire at 20 years as a Master Sergeant.

After retiring, Santy opened his very successful insurance agency. Continuing his military advocacy, he organized the Montana Military Retirees Association and successfully defeated several anti-military bills in the Montana Legislature. One bill would have closed the VA Hospital in Helena, MT.

Additionally, before Tricare replaced Champus, he initiated two separate federal Congressional investigations of the program, as Champus was inadequately paying military medical bills.

"In my community, I served on the Board of Directors of a multi-state federal credit union for over 30 years, served on the Board of Child and Family Services, served as Board president of a local mall, and even volunteered for a six-month AKC Collie rescue. I dedicated many years to youth sports and scouting," said Santy. "I am proud that my military legacy has been carried on by ten of my children and grandchildren who have served or are currently serving in the military," he added.

He is honored to serve as this year's Korean War Veteran Grand Marshal in the Parade.



In Honor of World War II Veteran

Mike C. Gomez 1/9/1925-9/24/2025

U.S. Army Veteran

Mike C. Gomez was born in Phoenix at the house his Dad built on January 9, 1925. He was a fourth generation Arizonan and a native Phoenician and grew up in the Grant Park area of Phoenix, attending Grant and Lowell Schools. During high school at Phoenix Union, he joined the Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps, worked for the Civilian Conservation Corps and met his future wife who he married in 1943.

Mike Gomez loved to say, "the U.S. Army offered me a job" in May of 1943 as World War II had begun. He landed at Omaha

Beach during the D-Day invasion, served under General Patton in the Third Army, fought in many battles including the Battle of the Bulge. One of his best memories of that time was marching with the Free French in the liberation of Paris. He also saw much suffering including the liberation of a concentration camp.



After the war, Gomez served in the Arizona National Guard, worked as a Right of Way Agent for the County, then went to work for the Department of the Interior, Bureau of Reclamation also as a Right of Way Agent. He negotiated and purchased land for the construction of the Central Arizona Project.

Gomez was a founding member (1945) of the Tony F. Sosa-Ray Martinez American Legion Post 41, Phoenix, AZ. Mike Gomez was an active member and leader, serving and assisting Veterans. He was also the longest living member (80 years) of Post 41 until his passing.

Gomez was selected as a Veteran Grand Marshal, but due to his untimely death, was unable to fulfill the honor.





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Vietnam War Veteran Grand Marshal

Roger Sandeen

U.S. Army

Roger Sandeen was born on November 14, 1945, in Fremont, Nebraska. He and his three younger sisters were raised in an impoverished family by a World War II veteran and his wife. He graduated from Midland Lutheran College with a BSBA degree in June 1968, thanks to student loans and scholarships. The Selective Service System then changed his classification to 1A – Available for unrestricted military service. Rather than start a new job and wait to be drafted, Sandeen enlisted in the Army for two years of active duty. Although the war had become increasingly unpopular, he

wanted to serve his country. "After all," he said, "America provided student loans for my college education through the National Defense Education Act of 1958."

Sandeen was sent to Fort Lewis for basic training and graduated in late August 1968. He was then given orders for advanced infantry training also at Fort Lewis, graduating in October 1968. He was then issued orders to report to Fort Lewis for deployment to South Vietnam in January 1969.

He served with the 9th Infantry Division in the Mekong Delta area. He was assigned to Delta Company, 3rd Battalion, 47th Regiment operating out of a company



base camp in Kien Hoa province. He served as an individual fire crewman, performing various combat roles, including platoon point man. Sandeen and his platoon sergeant, Donnie Lee Miller, were wounded in action by a booby-trapped grenade on March 17, 1969. After surgery and physical therapy, he returned to his combat unit in mid-April.

During his service in Vietnam, Roger Sandeen was awarded 11 medals, including the Bronze Star, Purple Heart, and Air and Army Commendation medals. He was diagnosed with PTSD because of his Vietnam

service by the VA a few years ago. Roger completed the PTSD treatment program at the Phoenix VA medical center. Although the traumatic memories of Vietnam never go away, he says he now has better skills to cope with PTSD.

Upon completion of his active duty obligation, he returned to civilian life and became a CPA. He worked in public accounting and corporate America for over 45 years, spanning Omaha, Kansas City, Minneapolis, and ultimately Phoenix. In addition to his professional life, Sandeen has volunteered for several non-profit organizations that serve those in need, particularly veterans. His only son, Chris, is a teacher based in San Diego.







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Cold War Veteran Grand Marshal


Carl Bryon Forkner

U.S. Navy Commander (Ret.)

Born in Chicago, IL, in 1958, Carl Forkner served 28 years as a Naval Flight Officer and Surface Warfare Officer. He began his Navy career as a Naval Flight Officer in the P-3C Orion aircraft, based in Jacksonville, FL, and participated in deployed operations against Libya in 1986. He then spent two years as a joint Advanced Navigation Instructor at Mather Air Force Base (AFB), CA, before rejoining the Navy on the staff of Carrier Group ONE in North Island, CA, where he flew the S-3A/B aircraft carrier-based aircraft. His Department Head tour took him to Ventura, CA, from where he deployed

four times to Antarctica in support of the National Science Foundation. He was selected for a Fellowship at the Pentagon, from which he was promoted to Deputy Director for Naval Matters at the Center for Naval Analyses.

Following his tour in Washington, DC, he reported to the USS Carl Vinson (CVN-70) in Bremerton, WA, as Combat Direction Center Officer, Assistant Operations Officer, and Integrated Training Team Leader. On September 11, 2001, the ship was off the west coast of India, en route to the Persian Gulf, but it took station in the North Arabian Sea. It was here that the battle group and air wing launched the first strikes into Afghanistan on October 7, 2001. He returned home in 2002, becoming the Senior Naval Officer at NORAD's Western Air Defense Sector HQ at McChord AFB, WA, where he was responsible for directing airborne



After retiring from the Navy, he completed the first of two Ph.D. degrees and then worked as the Chief Operations Officer for a Tempe training company. He left the business world in 2018 to volunteer full-time for the Disabled American Veterans (DAV) in Mesa, AZ, where

he served as a Veteran Service Officer, Chapter Adjutant, and Chapter Commander, before being elected Junior Vice Commander for the state DAV organization. In June 2025, he became Department Adjutant and CEO for DAV in Arizona.

His civic accomplishments include serving as a Boy Scout leader, a Dementia Friends Champion, Secretary/Treasurer of the Board of Directors of Resurrection Street Ministry, which supports homeless and underserved veterans, and Chair of the Mesa Chamber Veterans Program.

Carl Forkner is an outstanding leader who exemplifies honor, courage, and a commitment to his community and its residents, as well as to veterans.





Desert Storm Grand Marshal


Kathy Lowrey Gallowitz

U.S. Air Force Lt. Colonel (Ret.)

Lt. Col. Kathy Gallowitz served 29 years in the U.S. Air Force on active duty, in the Reserve, and National Guard as a nurse and public affairs officer. Early in her career, she was a flight nurse and one of the initial leaders who developed and implemented the Armed Services' Sexual Assault Response Program.

In response to 9/11, she created and led an unprecedented statewide outreach initiative for the Ohio National Guard, pioneering civilian engagement supporting troops and their families. Under her leadership, the program advanced military hiring best practices, expanded military ministries, increased the number of TRICARE providers, and facilitated militaryfriendly initiatives in public schools and colleges. Many Civilian Veteran Champions she collaborated with are featured in her book "Beyond Thank You for Your Service: The Veteran Champion Handbook for Civilians."

As Founder and President of Vanguard Veteran, LLC, Gallowitz serves as a strategic advisor, helping employers build in-house Veteran hiring capabilities to attract and retain veterans, strengthen teams, and boost productivity. She also speaks widely on becoming a Veteran Champion,



Since moving to Arizona, Gallowitz has been a catalyst for veteran initiatives. She founded VetConnect, launched Women Who Lead and its annual summits, helped a Chamber of Commerce implement a military transition support program and Veteran Champion Award, played a role in mobilizing the legal community to host Arizona's first Veteran Treatment Court conference,

served as chair of the Arizona Veterans Services Advisory Commission,

and was appointed to the state's inaugural Veteran Caucus Advisory Board. In recognition of her lifelong service, Kathy was inducted into the Arizona Veterans Hall of Fame, Class of 2025.

Gallowitz and her husband, Ed, a career Army combat veteran, enjoy traveling, and together they cherish seven children and nine grandchildren.





Operation Iraqi Freedom Veteran Grand Marshal

Rick Kreiberg

U.S. Army Command Sergeant Major (Ret.)

Rick Kreiberg was born on Fairchild Air Force Base (AFB) in Spokane, WA, and served in the United States Army for 35 years from 1983 until 2018. He served in multiple locations stateside and overseas, including a deployment to Iraq in 2004.

His career encompassed logistics, aviation, recruiting and retention, transportation, maintenance, training, operations, procurement, civil affairs, and installation management. He also led at every level from squad leader to brigade Command Sergeant Major. He earned numerous awards and decorations, most notably the Legion

of Merit Medal, Bronze Star Medal, Meritorious Service Medal with eight Oak Leaf Clusters, the Combat Action Badge, Parachutist Badge, Air Assault Badge, and the Gold Recruiter Badge with three sapphires.

Kreiberg's military education encompasses every level of Non-Commissioned Officer Professional Development, including the Sergeant's Major Academy (Class 59). He also completed the Joint Senior Leaders Course, the Pre-Command Course, the Garrison Leaders Course, Logistics Management Course, Battle Staff Course, US Army Airborne School, Air Assault Course, and US Army Recruiting School.

After retiring from the Army, Kreiberg discovered that pre 9/11 Veterans, especially Vietnam Veterans, were not



getting the same level of resources, care, and respect that post 9/11 Veterans receive. To address the needs of those who served before him, Rick founded the non-profit Veterans Affinity, which helps Veteran seniors (at no cost) with housing, healthcare, honors, and benefits.

Kreiberg says he and his team of volunteers are truly minimizing barriers to Veterans' care. "To date, Veterans Affinity has enrolled nearly 2,000 veterans into the VA healthcare system, coordinated long-term and hospice care for almost 1,000 veterans, escorted over

500 housebound Veterans to their medical appointments, and assisted over 600 Veterans with their VA pension and survivors' benefit claims."

Kreiberg also made it his personal mission to ensure every Veteran, regardless of status or service dates, is seen, heard, supported, and remembered. He and his volunteers make that happen every day by visiting isolated Veterans, comforting terminally ill Veterans bedside, building camaraderie through Veteran coffee hour socials across Arizona, and hosting Welcome Home Ceremonies for those who never received one.

Kreiberg's pride and joy are his two adult children, Chad (24) and Chloe (20). ■





Operation Enduring Freedom Veteran Grand Marshal

Wesley Brandon Reid

U.S. Army Master Sergeant (Ret.)

Wesley Brandon Reid is a distinguished Master Sergeant in the U.S. Army with over two decades of exemplary service in biomedical equipment maintenance and healthcare technology management. Reid has built an exceptional career combining technical expertise, leadership excellence, and educational innovation within the military healthcare system.

Reid's military journey began with specialized training as a Biomedical **Equipment Maintenance Technician** from 2000 to 2020. His commitment to professional development is evident through his extensive educational achievements, including two Associate of Applied Science degrees from the Community College of the Air Force in Biomedical Equipment Technology and Instructor of Technology & Military Science.

His operational experience spans multiple critical assignments, including a combat deployment to Afghanistan (2008-2009) as the Computed Tomography Crew Chief with the 583rd Medical Logistics Company during Operation Enduring Freedom. In this role, he managed maintenance support for over 3,000 pieces of medical equipment in a remote and austere environment, achieving 99% uptime for his most critical equipment. This achievement earned him the Combined Joint Task Force-82 Logistics Hero Award and the Combat Action Badge.

Reid's leadership capabilities truly flourished in his role as Healthcare Technology Manager at Tripler Army Medical Center, Hawaii (2014-2017), where he served as Senior Clinical Engineering Non-Commissioned Officer in charge for the largest overseas military treatment facility in the Pacific theater's area of responsibility. He managed a 65-member workforce, oversaw \$155 million in medical equipment, and supervised annual acquisitions exceeding \$30 million.

His last assignment was as the Army Service Lead for the Medical Education and

Training Campus DoD Biomedical Equipment Technician training Program (2017-2020), MSG Reid supervised 42 instructors and oversaw training for over 400 tri-service and foreign students annually. His academic contributions include revamping the curriculum to incorporate networking and cybersecurity, as well as serving as an adjunct faculty member at the Uniformed Services University of Health Sciences.

He now works at Banner Health Plans and Networks as Director of Technology Management. ■

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
