

Last quarter, I asked who had been interviewed in the Veterans Heritage Project "Since You Asked" books. I have read the entries

and tip my hat to those that have participated.

During the previous three months, there were 7,915 page views on the Perch Base website during 2,997 sessions by 2,034 users based on Google Analytics. These numbers are quite a bit higher than typical and are attributed to a lot of people checking out the ASSM Dedication Ceremony. Approximately 51% of the sessions originated in the US, 7% from China, 4% from Indonesia, and the remainder were widely scattered around the world. Approximately 24% of the U.S. based sessions were from locations in Arizona, which is assumed to come from our membership. The Glossary, ASSM Dedication and the Links page had the most visits.

During May, the Facebook PAGE had 139 Page Views (number of times a PAGE's profile has been viewed,) 14 Page Likes (the number of new people who liked our page,) 573 Post Reach (number of people who saw any post at least once) and 130 Post Engagement (number of times people engaged with posts thru reactions, comments, shares and clicks).

Russia's most advanced cruise missile nuclear sub arrives at Zapadnaya Litsa

The "Kazan" cruise missile submarine docked for the first time in Zapadnaya Litsa after sailing north from her construction yard in Severodvinsk, the press service of the Northern Fleet informed on June 1.

The nuclear-powered submarine took 12 years to build and is the first in a serie of the Yasen-M class vessels, an improved version of the first prototype, the "Severodvinsk" that came to the Northern Fleet in 2013. Seven similar submarines are currently under construction, with the last expected to be commissioned in 2027.

Zapadnaya Litsa is the westernmost of the Northern Fleet's submarine bases on the Kola Peninsula, famous during the Cold War famous for both being homeport to the six giant Typhoon submarines but also most of the prototype nuclear-powered subs in the Soviet navy, like the "Komsomolets" (K-278).

Piers in Nerpitcha were specially constructed to serve the Typhoons. Located only 60 km from the border to Norway, Zapadnaya Litsa got special attention in 2019 when the "Severodvinsk" fired a Kalibr cruise missile without leaving the pier.

It was said to be the first time a nuclear-powered submarine launched a cruise missile directly from the base, a move drastically shortening the time it takes to make a submarine ready for combat.

Additionaly to the ship and land attack Kalibr missile, the "*Kazan*" submarine can carry Oniks anti-ship missiles and Kh-101 cruise missiles.



USS New Hampshire Carries on Submarine Battle Flag Tradition

The Virginia-class attack submarine USS New Hampshire (SSN 778), homeported at Naval Station Norfolk, participated in a longstanding submarine tradition during its recent deployment.

New Hampshire Sailors honored their recent deployment by creating a submarine battle flag. The flag consists of patches stitched together, each one representing an accomplishment or memory made by the crew.

Cmdr. Bennett Christman, New Hampshire's commanding officer, spoke on the importance of Sailors using submarine battle flags to maintain the connection to submariners of the past.

"Each symbol represents one specific achievement, however, the manner of its display is a longstanding tradition that connects modern submariners to the earliest days of our profession," said Christman. "Successful World War II patrols of boats like Barb, Tang, and Wahoo were best represented by the battle flags crafted by their Sailors."

Originating in World War II, battle flags were a way for Sailors to keep an unofficial record of the number of ships sank. Although today's flag holds a different meaning, Sailors continue to create battle flags to show respect to those who came before them and document peacetime events.

"While New Hampshire's flag does not document combat operations like on Barb, Tang or Wahoo, it represents success in the most demanding peacetime operations," said Christman. "The crew, the force, and the nation can take pride in the events this flag represents."

According to Master Chief Sonar Technician (Submarine) Billy Singletary, New Hampshire's chief of the boat, battle flags also serve as a reminder of the importance of preserving Navy traditions and customs.

"It is important to pass along submarine history and traditions for several reasons, the most important being we must understand where we came from," said Singletary. "We must understand the humble beginnings of man-powered propulsion and reflect on the nuclear juggernauts we have become. By understanding the sacrifices of those who went before us, we can become a better force and nation."

On May 7, 2021, New Hampshire returned home after a deployment where it executed the chief of naval operations' maritime strategy by supporting national security interests and maritime security operations. Upon New Hampshire's return, the battle flag consisted of:

- the number four to commemorate the boat's 4th deployment
- a gold submarine warfare device, also known as 'dolphins', accompanied with the number five to display how many officers earned the insignia on deployment
- silver 'dolphins' accompanied with the number 23, representing how many enlisted Sailors earned their warfare device on the deployment
- a cross-wrench with the number 33 representing the number of times New Hampshire Sailor's ingenuity helped while fixing equipment
- the number five and a bullseye to signify specific mission accomplishments

Fast-attack submarines are multi-mission platforms enabling five of the six Navy maritime strategy core capabilities - sea control, power projection, forward presence, maritime security, and deterrence. They are designed to excel in anti-submarine warfare, anti-ship warfare, strike warfare, special operations, intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance, irregular warfare and mine warfare. Fast-attack submarines project power ashore with special operations forces and Tomahawk cruise missiles in the prevention or preparation of regional crises.

The Virginia-class submarine is 377 feet long and 34 feet wide, and weighs about 7,900 tons when submerged. Underwater, it can reach speeds in excess of 25 knots.

Quiet, deadly and expensive: The Navy's costly plan to upgrade aging submarines

Submarines are quiet, deadly and expensive. Boats like those in the Virginia class, which is a U.S. attack submarine, can cost \$3.4 billion and take seven years to build. The Navy has ambitious goals for the future of the underwater fleet, but some problems could stand in the way.

"The Navy is undergoing a 20-year plan that will cost \$21 billion to upgrade its infrastructure," said Aidan Quigley, a reporter at Inside Defense who covers the U.S. Navy and Marines. "Right now, the state of Navy shipyard infrastructure is not great. They've been underfunded for the past couple of decades." The Navy

currently has 68 submarines in service. And it wants to start shipbuilding on two to possibly three Virginia-class attack subs per year, and roughly one Columbia-class submarine per year until around 2035. But according to the Congressional Budget Office, a lack of shipyard infrastructure could delay those plans. "The Navy is focusing on improving productive capacity via initiatives to increase on-time delivery and operational availability while reducing maintenance costs," said Navy Lt. Rob Reinheimer, in a statement to CNBC.

And in response to the Government Accountability Office report on Columbiaclass procurement released in January, Reinheimer said, "Over the past three years the Navy, with strong Congressional support, has invested over \$573 million in shoring up existing sources and development of new suppliers." The recently released defense budget request for fiscal 2022 could be less than what the Navy needs to keep pace with China and Russia, according to some observers.

SUBPAC Shifts Tactical Control of SSBNS to Submarine Group 9

SILVERDALE, WA -- Commander, Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet (COMSUBPAC) transferred command of Commander, Task Group (CTG) 114.3 to Commander, Submarine Group (COMSUBGRU) 9, June 7.

The shift aligns the tactical control of ballistic-missile submarine (SSBN) forces at the same echelon on both the East and West coasts, following the establishment of both a Joint Force Maritime Component Commander and a Task Force Commander for Strategic Forces. The shift of tactical control to Group 9 is a great example of how the submarine force continues to prioritize agility and command and control at the most appropriate level," said Rear Adm. Jeff Jablon, commander, SUBPAC. "Placing the tactical control of our SSBNs at Group 9 provides an opportunity for enhancing coordination and cooperation between force readiness and operational demands on the Ohio-class SSBNs stationed in Bangor."


The responsibilities of CTG 114.3 are to exercise tactical control over Pacific Ohio-class SSBNs, coordinate and conduct submarine-launched ballistic missile test launches, and direct/coordinate strategic exercises for SSBNs in the Pacific.

"The transfer of tactical control of our sea-based, strategic-deterrent force is an exciting development for our command and will provide some important geographic advantages for the mission set," said Rear Adm. Doug Perry, commander, Submarine Group 9. "The Group 9 staff has worked incredibly

hard with our counterparts at SUBPAC to execute this transfer. Our team is ready to take on this responsibility and we look forward to continuing to provide our nation with a consistent and credible deterrent from the sea." Subordinate to Commander, Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet, COMSUBGRU 9 exercises administrative command and control authority for assigned ballistic and cruise missile submarines, and subordinate commands and units in the Pacific Northwest. Subordinate commands include Submarine Squadrons 17 and 19 and Naval Submarine Support Center, Bangor. The assignment of CTG 114.3 responsibilities to Group 9 adds tactical control of SSBNs assigned under the combatant command of U.S. Strategic Command.

COMSUBPAC is the principal advisor to Commander, U.S. Pacific Fleet for submarine matters. The force includes fast-attack, ballistic-missile and auxiliary submarines, submarine tenders, floating submarine docks, deep submergence vehicles and submarine rescue vehicles throughout the Pacific. They provide anti-submarine warfare, anti-surface ship warfare, precision land strike, mine warfare, intelligence, surveillance, early warning and special warfare capabilities to U.S. Pacific Fleet.
