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


Our organization's purpose is . . .

Having trouble reading websites? Wondering why they design them using such small text? Fortunately, there is an easy tool to fix this and it is supported by all browsers. By opening the browsers menu (usually shown as three horizontal or vertical dots or lines) you will see zoom with a '+' and '-' next to it. Clicking the + will zoom in and the – will zoom out.

You can also use your mouse wheel by holding the ctrl key and scrolling up to zoom in, or down to zoom out. And to make it even easier, you can use your keyboard.

Again, holding the ctrl key you can press the '+' sign to zoom in, or the '-' sign to zoom out plus you get the added bonus of pressing the 0 (zero) key to reset to your default setting (usually 100%). Using the keys will work with either your number pad or the keys above the letters and it doesn't matter if you use the right or left ctrl key.

Extra tip: The mouse wheel will also work for your office suite programs such as Word or Excel.

Worst Nightmare

In late October 1985, Swordfish was delayed in departing Pearl Harbor due to the failure of the drain pump. A replacement was obtained from USS Skate, in the shipyard for decommissioning, but Swordfish put to sea before the pump was fully connected and tested, and the crew could not get the pump

to operate. Since the engine room bilges could not be pumped, by the evening of 23 October, the first day at sea, the water in the engine room lower level bilge was over the deck plates (more than four feet). The crew tried to use a portable submersible pump but were not successful.

When the water level got high enough to get up into the bottoms of the motors for the main lube oil pumps, causing grounds, the captain came aft and saw the situation and decided to take the boat shallow to allow pumping bilges. When the planesmen put a slight up-angle on the boat to come shallow the water in the bilges instantly rushed aft, greatly increasing its effect on trim (this is known as "free surface effect", later classes of subs have flood control bulkheads in engineroom lower level to prevent this) and causing an up-angle of about 45 degrees.

When "fire in engineroom lower level" was announced, due to water in the main lube oil pump motors, a man in the aft end of engineroom upper level opened the watertight door into the stern room, which swung into the stern room, to retrieve a fire extinguisher. Just then the up angle increased dramatically, and the bilge water began pouring in. The door was shut before the boat surfaced. With the boat on an even keel, the water came up to the deadlight in the door.

The maneuvering watchstanders began to take the immediate actions for loss of shaft lube oil; the throttleman began to shut the throttles for the main engines. Without propulsion, the extreme up-angle caused the ship to quickly stop and begin moving backwards, sinking stern first. When the fire was announced, the Engineer had gone to Maneuvering (the control center of the engine room). He saw the depth gauge indicating a rapid increase in depth, ordered "Ahead Full" on his own initiative, and opened the starboard forward throttle himself in an effort to drive the ship to the surface. In Control, the Captain saw similar indications, and ordered "Blow Aft!". Before the Chief of the Watch could initiate the blow on the aft group the up angle became so steep that he was unable to maintain footing and slid to the rear of the Control compartment. He quickly climbed back up to the emergency blow "chicken switches" and opened the after-group valve.

Swordfish surfaced successfully. However, during the up angle the freshwater drain collecting tank vents were submerged and sucked contaminated water into the feed system. The steam generator water could not

be analyzed immediately because nucleonics laboratory in the stern room had been inundated by the wave of bilge water. After a while, the leading ELT found the necessary reagents and analyzed samples from both steam generators on the top hat in reactor compartment upper level. By this time the boat was in direct communication with Naval Reactors, which ordered the reactor shut down and cooled down and steam generators drained and refilled. The emergency diesel generator, located in engineroom lower level, initially had water in the generator from the incident but it was drained, and the diesel was online before the reactor was shut down. The reactor was cooled down and steam generators were blown down with service air and refilled until all fresh water on the boat was exhausted, which was a couple of hours before arriving back in Pearl Harbor. Subsequent analysis of steam generator water revealed no leakage of reactor coolant into the steam generators.

Three of the boat's four air conditioning compressors were shut down as part of the rig for reduced electrical. The temperature in the ship exceeded 80 °F (27 °C) with near 100% humidity for the several hours required for a tugboat to be dispatched from Pearl Harbor and tow Swordfish home. The tugboat, USS Reclaimer arrived the next morning and began the tow around noon, arriving back in Pearl Harbor just after midnight.

The actions of the Chief of the Watch and the Engineer saved Swordfish and her crew. The boat spent the rest of 1985 in port making repairs and returned to sea in January 1986, making a successful deployment to the western Pacific later in 1986.
















A very rich man once found the way that he could take it with him when he died. So, he called in 3 men, a surface sailor an airdale and a submariner.

3-year overhaul at Puget Sound shipyard propels USS Maine back to service

BREMERTON -- Another of the Navy's ballistic missile submarines has gotten a new lease on life thanks to nearly three years' worth of work at the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard.

The USS Maine recently emerged capable of 20 additional years of service, enabling the Navy to shore up its top priority of "strategic deterrence" with a submarine capable of stealthy nuclear strikes.

The refueling of the Maine's nuclear reactor required 700,000 worker-days of maintenance and cost \$371 million. The submarine was commissioned in 1995.

"The slogan 'Remember the Maine' is often attributed to this ship's name," Chris Byron, the shipyard's project superintendent, said, referencing the rallying cry after the former ship Maine sank in Havana harbor in 1898, precipitating the Spanish-American War. "And (it's) a fitting slogan to carry forward as we continue our journey to new projects and jobs in the shipyard."

The Maine and its 13 fellow "boomers" of the Ohio-class are the largest submarines the country has built. Each can carry 20 Trident ballistic missiles with "multiple, independently targeted warheads," according to the Department of Defense. (It is customary that before the work like the USS Maine's overhaul, the submarine's nuclear weapons are deposited at Naval Base Kitsap-Bangor for safekeeping).

Eight of the 14 subs, including the Maine, are homeported at Naval Base-Kitsap Bangor. Their role: provide a decisive counterstrike should the need ever arise — creating, as the Navy calls it, "strategic deterrence."

The Navy views strategic deterrence as its top priority. In the country's "nuclear triad" —consisting of the subs, bombers and land launchers — it is the "most survivable leg," given its clandestine location under the waves.

But there was a time not long ago the Navy was unsure how it would bridge the Ohio class to the next generation of strategic deterrence submarine, which has been branded the Columbia class.

The 12 submarines of the new class are expected to join the fleet between 2031 and 2042, according to the Department of Defense's Inspector General in a report in June 2018. The Navy budget proposal for 2020 includes about \$2.3 billion in funding, on the road to an estimated \$313 billion for the whole program, according to the United States Naval Institute.

In the meantime, the Ohio-class must stick it out. The first "Engineered Refueling Overhaul" was the USS Ohio in 2002 and will conclude at Puget Sound Naval Shipyard — which has conducted nine of them — with the USS Louisiana, scheduled for 2021, according to the Inspector General report.

In 2015, the Navy formally designated strategic deterrence its top priority. Commanders of shipyards, including Puget Sound's, did the same for maintenance of them, placing the subs above aircraft carriers in importance, the inspector general's report said.

Navy leaders prioritized the Ohio-class overhauls after the USS Nebraska's took 40 months ending in 2017. On June 3, the Maine completed what was expected to be a 30-month overhaul in 32 months, still eight months shaved off the time it took for the Nebraska.

Shipyard officials said the Maine's overhaul included a number of innovations in the process of completing the work, along with better methods for "removing the superstructure, completing refueling hull cuts, installing shielding and employing a new training model and problem-solving strategy that halved the number of issues that arose on previous projects."

Cianbro wins \$12.2M contract at Portsmouth Navy Shipyard

Cianbro was awarded a \$12.2 million contract to expand the warehouse facility at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard (PNSY) in Portsmouth, N.H.

"I have long advocated for the Navy to address the modernization needs at Portsmouth Naval Shipyard, and I am so pleased to announce that the contract has been officially awarded for this critically needed upgrade," U.S. Sen. Susan Collins (R-ME), a senior member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, said.

The funding for the project was included in the fiscal year 2019 Military Construction and Veterans Affairs Appropriations bill, which was signed into law in September of 2018.

"PNSY is critical to southern Maine's economy and our national security," Collins continued. "This expansion will help ensure the readiness of our nation's submarine fleet and provide valuable support to the hardworking employees at the shipyard as they repair and modernize Navy submarines."

The warehouse facility will help the shipyard receive, inspect, and distribute submarine components for worldwide fleet support.

Collins, a member of the Senate Military Construction and Veterans Affairs Appropriations Subcommittee, has long championed the funding for this project.

Portsmouth Naval Shipyard's primary mission is to overhaul, repair and modernize the US Navy's submarine fleet.
