Russia tests latest underwater warfare technology in the Barents Sea

Protection is ensured by "Dmitry Donskoy", the only Typhoon-class submarine still in operation, state-affiliated news agency TASS on Tuesday reported.

"Krasnoyarsk" is the third of the upgraded Yasen-M multi-purpose subs armed with cruise missiles, torpedoes, and surface-to-air missiles. The vessel was launched last summer and set out from Severodvinsk to the White Sea for the first sea trials this spring.

For weapons testing and when performing the cat-and-mouse game, hiding and detecting, the larger Barents Sea is more suitable.

The other new submarine currently on sea trials in the waters north of the Kola Peninsula is "Generalissimo Suvorov". This is the third of the Borei-A class ballistic missile submarines armed with the Bulava intercontinental missile.

"Generalissimo Suvorov" started sea trials about the same time as "Krasnoyarsk".

When final approvals are given, both submarines are expected to be part of Russia's Pacific Fleet.

This weekend, the press service of the Northern Fleet said anti-submarine aviation was conducting exercises over the Barents Sea. Il-38 and Tu-142 aircraft, along with Ka-27 anti-submarine helicopters flew tactical search- and tracing training.

Yasen-class is Russia's 4th generation multi-purpose submarine and is of big concern for NATO in the North Atlantic. Its weapon capacities and ability to sail quietly and avoid detection could pose a threat to both military installations on land and enemy navy vessels.

Last fall, the first vessel of the class, the "Severodvinsk", made a first-time test launch of the hypersonic Tsirkon cruise missile in the Barents Sea.

Also armed with Kalibr missiles, the Yasen class subs could make big trouble for NATO's reinforcement plans for Europe in case of conflict by effectively hitting NATO navy ships in the North Atlantic.

I work for a couple of named companies but spent 20 years at Arizona State University with the Facilities Management Department. I was an operator then supervisor of the campus Central Plant and Utility Services. I retired from ASU in February of 2021.

I married Georgianne a little over 40 years ago and am presently residing in Mesa. Georgianne worked at Rio Salado college and retired a couple of years ago. We raised three children and enjoy our four grandchildren. After full retirement, I have invested much time in the valley of the sun veteran community and am a proud member of the Perch Base USSVI.



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First Woman to Serve as 'Chief of the Boat' on a Submarine Reports for Duty

The Navy's submarine community has announced a new historic first for women in the silent service: the first top enlisted sailor on a submarine.

In a statement released Wednesday, the Navy announced that Master Chief Information Systems Technician (Submarine) Angela Koogler joined the Gold crew of ballistic missile

submarine USS Louisiana as their Chief of the Boat on Aug. 22, 2022.

Koogler, who has been in the Navy for 20 years, remarked that both her journey and that of female sailors is far from over. "We need to keep breaking down the barriers so that it just becomes all Sailors," she said in the statement. "It's important to integrate everybody and it shouldn't matter as long as they get the job done."

The history of women aboard U.S. Navy submarines is limited, as female officers were only allowed to serve on submarines starting in 2011. Enlisted sailors followed in 2016. The process was also not without trouble and controversy.

There was an incident aboard the USS Wyoming in 2014 where sailors were caught secretly video-taping female submariners undressing and showering. Then, in 2019, sailors aboard the USS Florida were investigated and punished over allegations of a "rape list" of female sailors stationed aboard the submarine. That boat was the second submarine to integrate women.

Koogler was one of the first enlisted sailors to volunteer to serve on submarines. Wednesday's press release noted that she reported to her first submarine, the guided-missile submarine USS Michigan, in May 2016.

"Every time I was up for orders, I was always looking for something different and challenging," Koogler said. "When it was announced that enlisted women could apply for submarines, with some encouragement from my Sailors, I went ahead and applied."

Submarine Squadron 19's Command Master Chief, Travis Brown, called Koogler's appointment to Louisiana's top enlisted spot "a huge glass ceiling busted in the submarine force."

"Now there's a path to the top of the submarine force," he added.

The news also comes only weeks after another major first for the Navy. The service's first female aircraft carrier commanding officer, Capt. Amy Bauernschmidt, just returned home from her first deployment earlier this month.

For her part, Koogler said she is not ready to rest on her achievements. The sailor now has her eyes set on becoming a Command Master Chief -- a top enlisted leader in a Navy command.

"Now that I've converted to the submarine force I have to serve as chief of the boat before I can go into the CMC world, so this is just another stepping stone," she said.

World's Most Advanced Attack Submarine Joins British Navy

A submarine touted as the world's most advanced hunter-killer submersible has joined the United Kingdom's Royal Navy fleet.

The submarine was welcomed Wednesday at a ceremony in Barrow, England.

The £1.3 billion (\$1.5 billion) HMS Anson is touted as offering naval stealth and striking power, and is able to gather vital intelligence, protect other Royal Navy vessels from threats above and below the waves, and destroy enemy military infrastructure with pinpoint accuracy.

The submarine was commissioned at BAE Systems' yard in Cumbria in England's northwest in front of her crew and their families, plus naval leaders, Secretary of State for Defense Ben Wallace, Prime Minister Boris Johnson, Australian Deputy Prime Minister Richard Marles, and the patron, Julie Weale.

It has taken more than 11 years - and some 20 million hours' work by an estimated 10,000 people from 400 firms and organizations across the U.K. - for the 8,000-ton vessel to be ready for action. Anson is the fifth of the new Astute-class submarines to join the Royal Navy fleet, joining HMS Astute, Ambush, Artful, and Audacious.

The submarine's first commanding officer, Commander David Crosby, said that given the effort, skill and enterprise invested in constructing the submarine, made more challenging over the past two and a half years by the restrictions imposed by the pandemic: "HMS Anson would go on to be the best Astute-class submarine yet."

He continued: "Among tough competition that is a bold claim, but I fully believe it; she will be successful on operations for years to come and be envied by nations across the globe. The good fortune to be commanding officer of the most advanced and capable attack submarine ever built in the U.K. on her commissioning day is the greatest honor of my submarine

career."

Also among those eager to see Anson in action is the new head of the Royal Navy Submarine Service, Commodore Paul Dunn.

"The commissioning is a significant milestone for both Anson and the Submarine Service and I would like to thank the crew, BAE Systems and the 'submarine enterprise' for the delivery of our fifth Astute class," Dunn said. "I look forward to welcoming Anson to Her Majesty's Naval Base Clyde, the home of the Submarine Service, in the near future."

Armed with a combination of up to 38 Spearfish torpedoes and Tomahawk Block V cruise missiles, Anson can take out enemy ships/submarines, destroy land targets up to 1,000 miles away, and launch and recover Royal Marines raiding and reconnaissance teams, among other capabilities.

"Given the world we live in, there is no more important tool in the United Kingdom's arsenal: silent, unseen, and a key instrument of our global, modern, ready Royal Navy. HMS Anson is the cutting edge in submarine design and construction... ensuring operational advantage in the underwater battlespace, the last great stealth domain.

"The Royal Navy's nuclear submarines: protecting critical national infrastructure, securing the nuclear deterrent, and ready to deliver firepower against those who would do us harm," said First Sea Lord, Admiral Sir Ben Key.

The Astute program is one of the most complex engineering projects in the world. Anson will remain in Barrow for several more weeks undergoing final checks, tests and tweaks to her system before she sails for her future home at HM Naval Base Clyde in Faslane, Scotland, where she will prepare for sea trials.

The chaplain of the fleet, the Venerable Andrew Hillier, blessed Anson and her 98 crew after Crosby read out instructions received from the Navy's Fleet Commander to commission the submarine and prepare her for frontline service.

Proceedings ended with the White Ensign being hoisted for the first time and a commissioning cake cut by Weale and the youngest member of the crew. Anson's patron, Weale - whose husband was head of the Silent Service before retiring in 2020 - told those present that the boat was "fabulous," and she was keen now to see the submarine at sea and enter service.

"I wish you all the best of luck with what is to follow and will be in full support of everything you do," she added.

Anson was officially named by Weale in the same yard in December 2020 with a bottle of cider smashed against the hull. Cider was favored by her namesake, 18th century Admiral George Anson, as a cure for scurvy. HMS Anson was rolled out of the cavernous Devonshire Dock Hall in April last year and slowly lowered into wet dock, where engineers and crew have been working on her systems and testing equipment.

In February, the boat conducted a dive in Barrow to ensure the dive/surface systems and ballast tanks, depth sensors and sonars were in full working order and Anson was accurately balanced and stable when submerged.

Delayed Repairs Shrink the U.S Navy Submarine Fleet

Amid China's threats to Taiwan, maintenance woes hobble a key weapon in the Indo-Pacific.

The U.S. Navy's submarine fleet, America's essential war-fighting instrument in the Indo-Pacific, is about three-fifths the size it should be, chiefly because of maintenance and production delays. This comes amid stepped-up threats to Taiwan by China.

Contesting such an assault would require a submarine force at maximum strength. Congress and the White House should act swiftly to integrate private shipyards that repair submarines into the Navy's maintenance plans.

American strategists rarely concern themselves with the material issues that determine victory or defeat. They tend to regard international strategy as a question of will, not means. This takes for granted the traditional and outsize U.S. economic-material advantage.

America's objective in a struggle over Taiwan would be to deny China a rapid victory. The war must become a slog, one that China labors to sustain in a geographically limited form. Generating this situation requires contesting China's ability to stage an amphibious assault on Taiwan. Submarines would be crucial in such a contest.

The U.S. military today lacks the air forces, air defenses, and surface combatants with sufficient range to contest Chinese air control over Taiwan indefinitely, absent an interdiction campaign against the Chinese mainland that the U.S. has signaled it doesn't wish to wage. Chinese anti-ship and ground-attack missiles, moreover, would cause damage. Recent war

games suggest that in defending Taiwan, the U.S. would lose half its active air force and at least one carrier strike group—a collection of warships defending the aircraft carrier and its air wing. In such a scenario, China would lose 150 to 200 warships and tens of thousands of men.

Given Chinese force structure and military objectives, U.S. submarines are the most effective tool to counter an assault on Taiwan. China lacks ground-based aviation with robust antisubmarine capabilities, leaving its military and civilian transports vulnerable to submarine attack. The U.S. has a world-leading attack submarine force of 49 nuclear-powered boats, along with four guided-missile submarines each packed with 154 cruise missiles. In theory, around 42 of these boats should be deployable at a given time, with some 25 to 30 in the Pacific and 10 to 15 in the Atlantic, Mediterranean and Middle East. Normal schedules dictate that at any point 10% of the fleet is in dry dock, under repair or in overhaul.

A major submarine surge to the Indo-Pacific, keeping in mind the U.S. forward-support facilities in Guam, could number about 35 subs. A handful of Japanese and Australian subs could be added to the mix, and perhaps one from Taiwan. Taiwan currently has two aging operational submarines, but its Indigenous Defense Submarine program is promising. That means the PLA would face a 40-plus strong submarine force that can sink transports as they move men and materiel across the Taiwan Strait. That could erode a naval blockade enough to enable an American counterattack. China's 53 attack submarines, roughly 40 to 45 of them deployable, may have numerical parity, but several are aging, and few have the advanced capabilities of U.S. subs. For China, that would make a Taiwan war a close-run thing.

Rear Adm. Jeffrey Jablon, the U.S. Pacific Fleet's submarine commander, said at a conference this year that maintenance delays hamstring the submarine force. As of fiscal 2022, the U.S. submarine fleet spent about 1,500 days waiting for maintenance or repair. That is equivalent to losing four submarines in the fleet. In the past year, the Navy lost the equivalent of another 3.5 submarines to maintenance that took longer than expected. The Navy's submarine force is eight boats under strength on average. Combined with standard maintenance expectations of one-tenth of the fleet, this brings the U.S. submarine force down to about 30 deployable attack boats.

The U.S. can't build its way out. On average, it takes American shipyards two years to deliver three subs. Meanwhile, the Navy retires two older Los Angeles-class subs a year owing to wear and tear. The fleet will shrink on average by one submarine every two years until the 2040s, when new subs are delivered in greater numbers than retiring ones.

Even with faster delivery and better production capacity, combat damage must be considered. More construction won't overcome the repair delays at shipyards. In wartime, when those yards are overworked—and possibly targeted—the U.S. submarine fleet likely will shrink even more, and faster, than anticipated. All the while, China will be relying on massive yards with civilian and military production capabilities. These large facilities can repair ships at a pace that gives China an advantage.

More resources are necessary for shipyards to bring the U.S. submarine force to the level of preparedness that China's provocations in the Western Pacific demand. The U.S. should invest in maintenance, extend the life of older submarines, and regularize maintenance so shipyards are ready to work on many subs.

The Navy should integrate private shipyards into its repair and maintenance plans. It takes at least a year, more likely several, for a yard to prepare to overhaul several ships at the same time. It is more efficient, financially and temporally, to turn to shipyards that can expand maintenance today, rather than scaling up public yards exclusively.

A nation goes to war with the military it has, not the one it will have in five, 10, or 20 years. The executive and legislative branches face a choice between continued inaction and a conflict that calls on the military we wish we had.





"**Bravo Zulu**" to Perch Base Life Member Brad Seidel, who "called out the guard" for the funeral and interment of World War II D-Day Army veteran Arthur Herzberg.

Sadly, by the time Arthur passed at the age of 97, he had outlived all his veteran friends and when Brad Seidel was notified of the lack of veterans to attend the ceremony, he put out the word and mustered about 15 other veterans from various services to attend the funeral and interment.

As part of the 90th Infantry Division, 359th Infantry, Company A, Arthur earned the nickname "Combat" because he saw so much front-line fighting. He was a private when he landed on Utah beach on D-Day, among the first wave of GIs to land on the beaches of Normandy. He served as First Scout of his platoon for almost four months, a position with a notoriously short life expectancy of two weeks. He received a field promotion to sergeant and was awarded a Bronze Star for bravery. Among many other distinctions, he received a Purple Heart and a Legion of Honor Medal from France.

We expect to be lined up between 9:30 and 10:00 AM and the parade will roll at 11:00 AM.




