

major concerns is that in 2030 we all will look back and refer to 2020 as "the good old days".



As one of these non-quals I received plenty of motivation and endless complaints about how I was breathing someone else's air and eating their food. Needless to say I wasn't thinking much about Christmas.

On Christmas eve many of the crew members were opening letters and Christmas cards from their families that they had brought with them from home. The crews mess was decorated with Christmas lights, tinsel and laminated Playboy foldouts. The festive atmosphere and the life of a non-qual hit me rather hard and I started feeling sorry for myself as I hit the rack after my last watch that day.

Christmas morning, I climbed out of my rack and started pulling on my poopy suit when much to my surprise I found a stocking with my name hanging from the curtain. In it there were several pieces of candy, a small car and a rubber ball. The surprise and pure glee I felt for this small gift far exceeded that of any Christmas morning as a child waking to see what Santa had brought. This wonderful gift had been prepared by the wives of the crew for all on board. Nuclear-sub builder Sevmash now has 30,000 employees Russia's construction of nuclear-powered submarines hits post-Soviet peak. 15 sub are currently at different stages of readiness at the shipyard in Severodvinsk.

22-year-old Julia Kalach became employee No. 30,000 when she earlier this month got a job as design engineer at Russia's largest shipbuilding enterprise, the Sevmash, on the shores of the White Sea.

Welcoming Julia to the team, Deputy Director for Personnel Management, Vladimir Syrodubov, said "the 30,000strong team was the task given for this



year." With that, the shipyard can successfully complete the state defense order, the press service of Sevmash informs.

The order is outlined in the State Armament Programme for the ten-year period 2018 to 2027.

Sevmash is the only shipyard in Russia that builds nuclear-powered submarines. During Soviet times, the yard then known as Shipyard No. 402, built a total of 128 nuclear subs. Most of them, including five of the six giant Typhoons, are now taken out of active service and decommissioned.

In the 1990ies, the labor force at the yard worked in a mode of slow-motion.

One of the few new-buildings at the time was K-560, the first Yasen-class submarine named after the city itself, Severodvinsk. Construction started in 1993, but the vessel was first handed over to the navy 20 years later, in December 2013. Three years later, in 2016, the sub was declared combat ready.

Long-delayed, but today the Severodvinsk is the most advanced and heavily armed multi-purpose submarine in the Russian navy. When sailing on missions out from her homeport in Zapadnaya Litsa, NATO eyes are on special watch to track her movements in northern waters.

In post-Soviet days, the Sevmash has commissioned four other nuclear-powered submarines, additional to the Severodvinsk; the SSBNs Yury Dolgorukiy, Aleksandr Nevsky, Vladimir Monomakh and Knyaz Vladimir.

Next multi-purpose submarine in pipe for the Navy is the first serial production Yasen-M class, the Kazan, expected to be handed over to the Northern Fleet in March 2021. In late November, the Kazan successfully fired a Kalibr cruise missile from the White Sea.

The launch was part of final state tests needed before the navy will accept taking over the submarine from the Sevmash yard.

In the course of the next seven years, the shipyard by the coast of the White Sea will float out submarines of another speed, with technology and new weapons, that will dramatically impact the global power balance at sea.



A review by The Barents Observer of currently available open source information shows that Sevmash has at least 15 nuclear-powered submarines currently under construction.

Yasen-M class

The Kazan will be followed by seven Yasen-M class submarines, with the last to be commissioned in 2027 according to the State Armament Programme. All seven are already laid down and at different stages of construction. Five of class will sail for the Northern Fleet, based on the Kola Peninsula.

Belgorod

One submarine of special interest soon to be commissioned for active duty is the Belgorod (K-329). The sub is built on the hull of an Oscar-II class, although made longer, in order to carry special underwater equipment for military installations and operations on the Arctic shelf. Onboard are supposedly also room for Russia's new nuclear-powered, nuclear-armed, underwater drone, the Poseidon. Belgorod will sail for GUGI, the Main Directorate of Deep-Sea Research based in Olenya Bay on the Kola Peninsula and in Severodvinsk where the Poseidon drones are brought out to sea for testing.

The submarine is 184 meters long, 11 meters longer than the Typhoon submarines.

Khabarovsk

Another nuclear-powered submarine under construction at Sevmash, surrounded by secrecy, is the Kabarovsk. The sub will soon be floated out from the shop to the waters at the shipyard, but it is unclear when she will be handed over for active duty. Khabarovsk is the first of what is believed to be three or four vessels of the class, all supposedly aimed at carrying several of the Poseidon nuclear-powered drones.

In the longer run, but not yet laid-down, are three more of the Yasen-B class and probably two more Borei-A class submarines. Design work for the fifth generation nuclear-powered submarines are under way, but no dates are yet set for construction start.

Range of Tools In a Vast Hack Elevates Fears

WASHINGTON --Federal officials issued an urgent warning on Thursday that hackers who American intelligence agencies believed were working for the Kremlin used a far wider variety of tools than previously known to penetrate government systems, and said that the cyber offensive was "a grave risk to the federal government. "The discovery suggests that the scope of the hacking, which appears to extend beyond nuclear laboratories and Pentagon, Treasury and Commerce Department systems, complicates the challenge for federal investigators as they try to assess the damage and understand what had been stolen. Minutes after the statement from the cybersecurity arm of the Department of Homeland Security, President-elect Joseph R. Biden Jr. warned that his administration would impose "substantial costs" on those responsible. "A good defense isn't enough; we need to disrupt and deter our adversaries from undertaking significant cyberattacks in the first place," Mr. Biden said, adding, "I will not stand idly by in the face of cyber assaults on our nation. "President Trump has yet to say anything about the attack. Echoing the government's warning, Microsoft said Thursday that it had identified 40 companies, government agencies and think tanks that the suspected Russian hackers, at a minimum, had infiltrated. Nearly half are private technology firms, Microsoft said, many of them cybersecurity firms, like FireEye, that are charged with securing vast sections of the public and private sector. "It's still early days, but we have already identified 40 victims -- more than anyone else has stated so far -- and believe that number should rise substantially," Brad Smith, Microsoft's president, said in an interview on Thursday. "There are more nongovernmental victims than there are governmental victims, with a big focus on I.T. companies, especially in the security industry. "The Energy Department and its National Nuclear Security Administration, which maintains the American nuclear stockpile, were compromised as part of the larger attack, but its investigation found the hack did not affect "mission-essential national security functions," Shaylyn Hynes, a Department of Energy spokeswoman, said in a statement. "At this point, the investigation has found that the malware has been isolated to business networks only," Ms. Hynes said. The hack of the nuclear agency was reported earlier by Politico. Officials have yet to publicly name the attacker responsible, but intelligence agencies have told Congress that they believe it was carried out by the S.V.R., an elite Russian intelligence agency. A Microsoft "heat map" of infections shows that the vast majority -- 80 percent -- are in the United States, while Russia shows no infections at all. The government warning, issued by the Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency, did not detail the new ways that the hackers got into the government systems.

But it confirmed suspicions expressed this week by FireEye, a cybersecurity firm, that there were almost certainly other routes that the attackers had found to get into networks on which the day-to-day business of the United States depend. FireEye was the first to inform the government that the suspected Russian hackers had, since at least March, infected the periodic software updates issued by a company called SolarWinds, which makes critical network monitoring software used by the government, hundreds of Fortune 500 companies and firms that oversee critical infrastructure, including the power grid. Investigators and other officials say they believe the goal of the Russian attack was traditional espionage, the sort the National Security Agency and other agencies regularly conduct on foreign networks. But the extent and depth of the hacking raise concerns that hackers could ultimately use their access to shutter American systems, corrupt or destroy data, or take command of computer systems that run industrial processes. So far, though, there has been no evidence of that happening. The alert was a clear sign of a new realization of urgency by the government. After playing down the episode -- in addition to Mr. Trump's silence, Secretary of State Mike Pompeo has deflected the hacking as one of the many daily attacks on the federal government, suggesting China was the biggest offender -- the government's new alert left no doubt the assessment had changed. "This adversary has demonstrated an ability to exploit software supply chains and shown significant knowledge of Windows networks," the alert said. "It is likely that the adversary has additional initial access vectors and tactics, techniques and procedures," which, it said, "have not yet been discovered. "Investigators say it could take months to unravel the extent to which American networks and the technology supply chain are compromised. In an interview on Thursday, Mr. Smith, of Microsoft, said the supply-chain element made the attack perhaps the gravest cyberattack against the United States in years. "Governments have long spied on each other but there is a growing and critical recognition that there needs to be a clear set of rules that put certain techniques off limits," Mr. Smith said. "One of the things that needs to be off limits is a broad supply chain attack that creates a vulnerability for the world that other forms of traditional espionage do not. "Reuters reported Thursday that Microsoft was itself compromised in the attack, a claim that Mr. Smith emphatically denied Thursday. "We have no indication of that," he said. Officials say that with only one month left in its tenure, the Trump administration is planning to simply hand off what appears to be the biggest cybersecurity breach of federal networks in more than two decades. Mr. Biden's statement said he had instructed his transition team to learn as much as possible about "what appears to be a massive cybersecurity breach affecting potentially thousands of victims.

"I want to be clear: My administration will make cybersecurity a top priority at every level of government -- and we will make dealing with this breach a top priority from the moment we take office," Mr. Biden said, adding that he plans to impose "substantial costs on those responsible. "The Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency's warning came days after Microsoft took emergency action along with FireEye to halt the communication between the SolarWinds network management software and a command-and-control center that the Russians were using to send instructions to their malware using a socalled kill switch. That shut off further penetration. But it is of no help to organizations that have already been penetrated by an attacker who has been planting back doors in their systems since March. And the key line in the warning said that the SolarWinds "supply chain compromise is not the only initial infection vector" that was used to get into federal systems. That suggests other software, also used by the government, has been infected and used for access by foreign spies. Across federal agencies, the private sector and the utility companies that oversee the power grid, forensic investigators were still trying to unravel the extent of the compromise. But security teams say the relief some felt that they did not use the compromised systems turned to panic on Thursday, as they learned other third-party applications may have been compromised. Inside federal agencies and the private sector, investigators say they have been stymied by classifications and siloed approach to information sharing. "We have forgotten the lessons of 9/11," Mr. Smith said. "It has not been a great week for information sharing and it turns companies like Microsoft into a sheep dog trying to get these federal agencies to come together into a single place and share what they know."

U.S. Needs 'Resilient' Strategy to Counter China, Russia in Arctic, Experts Say



The United States "needs resilient people and resilient equipment" to meet mounting security and economic challenges posed by Russia and China, according to a panel of Arctic security experts. Moscow's vision of the Far North as "the Russian Mecca" and Beijing's ambitious Polar Silk Road initiative present economic obstacles to the United States, the experts said. Speaking Tuesday, retired Air Force Maj. Gen. Randy Kee said the Arctic had proven to be a region "where technology is always challenged" by extremes. The severe conditions make military operations "quite demanding and quite challenging."

This remains the case now as temperatures climb and cause sea levels to rise globally, coupled with more violent weather conditions. It also makes the Northern Sea Route, which Russia claims as its own, more attractive as a shipping route to Europe, especially for China. It opens the Arctic to more mineral and natural resource exploration and exploitation, another Chinese goal of diversifying its energy suppliers.

On the security front, Kee, now with the Wilson Center, said the best way to "ameliorate the challenges is through partnership agreements" – such as NATO and NORAD with the Canadians – and keeping an airbase in Thule, Greenland. While he underlined interoperability with partners and the need for investment in research and development, he added, "exercises [are] a critical element ... where we stress the force. "While saying exercises like Trident Juncture were important building blocks to show presence, Kee said "we need to return to scale" on the magnitude of the Cold War's Rimfrost Exercises to address the new military situation and climate changes. Kee, speaking during a Hudson Institute online forum, added that the services' Arctic strategies "will categorize the challenges and opportunities" in the region. Among those security challenges to Washington and allies are Russia's dual-track approach in the Arctic — building ports and airfields that can be used for civilian purposes for energy production and shipment, tourism and transpolar commercial shipping, as well as military power projection – according to Hudson's Richard Weitz. "The Arctic is the fourth wall" in Russia's security thinking, he said. Unlike its western, eastern and southern borders, Moscow can operate "without having to compete with others" in the Far North. It is by far the largest nation in the Arctic. As a sign of how important the Arctic has become, the Kremlin is designating the region as its Fifth Military District. It has moved Mig-31 fighters into airfields there and deployed hypersonic missiles, while it is hardening coastal defense ships that are capable of operating in ice as weapons platforms. Moreover, the Kola Peninsula is the major home port of the Russian ballistic missile submarine fleet, said Hudson's Bryan Clark. It could also be a region where the Chinese operate from. "Monitoring for [submarine activity] is important," but the United States Navy only operates in the Far North in the most favorable conditions, Clark said. Its surface fleet is not ice-hardened. Clark suggested large undersea unmanned vehicles with towed array sensors coupled with the passive Sound Surveillance Systems [SOSUS] would be ways to monitor submarine activity heading toward the Atlantic. Clark also noted another Russian military advantage in the Arctic. Because satellite communications are spotty and there are few sensors in the region, a Russian electronic warfare attack "can easily blind" the few operating there. "They don't have a lot of resilience," he said. Those facts make electronic warfare "more of a concern than in other regions" that need to be addressed.

Again, he suggested unmanned aerial systems for sensing and communications as a way to build resilience. But there's "not a lot of demand" for that kind of investment, Clark said. As a safety measure, particularly as merchant and potentially cruise ship transits increase, Clark said deploying an expeditionary sea base vessel would help search and rescue missions and also cut time and distance needed to care for the sick and injured. The lack of ice-hardened surface vessels in the Navy and the Coast Guard, which now operates only one heavy and one medium icebreaker, make Freedom of Navigation operations challenging Russian territorial claims difficult. The few American Coast Guard ships available also limit strict enforcement of fishing, mineral exploration and other regulations in the American Exclusive Economic Zone, the panel agreed. As for China's approach, Weitz said instead of being confrontational as it was six years ago by demanding recognition as a special case in Arctic affairs, Beijing is "emphasizing win-win." The Polar Silk Road is pushing infrastructure investment, including laying undersea communication cables, as well as ports, airports and highways "to build leverage" and to influence smaller nations in the Arctic like Greenland. It has also stepped up its research and scientific efforts in the region. In a 2018 White Paper, Weitz clearly states "China has a role" - from shipping routes to climate and mineral development - although it is 1,000 kilometers from the Arctic.

We are sad to report that Perch Base Life and Holland Club member and SVWWII member Robert Wayne Lents went on Eternal Patrol at the age of 99 on November 23, 2020.

Our condolences to his wife Carolyn and other members of the family.

Shipmate Robert W. "Bob" Lents, was believed to be the sole surviving member of the crew of USS PERCH (SS-176), our Perch Base namesake.

The USS Perch was forced to scuttle herself after being mortally wounded in a depth charge attack. All crew members were picked up by the Japanese, and sent to Prisoner of War camps. Six crew members of USS Perch (SS-176) died as Prisoners of War.

Bob was assigned to the USS Seawolf (SS-197) in 1940 prior to being reassigned to the USS Perch (SS-176), also in 1940, which was his qual boat.


